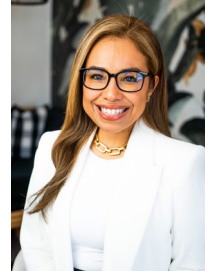

# PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE MENTORSHIP MATCHING SERVICE

**The Professional Development Committee (PDC)** supports the growth of ACE members at every career stage through the provision of educational and professional resources, including mentorship. Mentor-mentee pairing is a service available to all ACE members, fellows, associates, and affiliates – there is no cost to participate but the results can be invaluable.

**Requesting mentorship is simple: Use the button on the Committee webpage** to contact the PDC Chair via email and provide a brief description of what you are seeking in a mentor.

Are you looking to develop a specific skill or competency? Do you need support as you navigate a particular employment setting? Just want input from someone who has “been there” juggling multiple competing obligations? Do you need only a few meetings or are you seeking a longer-term pairing? Or just not sure where to begin? The PDC’s mentorship matching team can help you figure it out and provide personalized recommendations.

When initiating a request, mentees are welcome to provide demographic preferences in addition to details of the desired mentoring topic. These can include general descriptors such as employment setting or geographic location but may also comprise more personal traits of importance to the mentee regarding the match. Prior mentees have praised the sensitive matches, knowledgeable mentors, and subsequent positive mentorship experiences.

Mentor-mentee matching is a service not only for those seeking mentorship but also represents an opportunity for members to develop their mentoring skills. The PDC is pleased to count on many ACE members of diverse expertise who have already volunteered to serve as mentors. Additional ACE members who are willing to serve as mentors are invited to contact the PDC directly or sign up when they renew their membership. Of note, joining the volunteer list does not obligate members to take on any suggested matches, it simply indicates that they are open to considering the possibility. ACE members at any career stage and representing any area of specialization are encouraged to join the potential mentor list as each member’s unique experiences and skills may be just what someone else can benefit from!

## EQUITY AND INCLUSION UPDATE

We were delighted to see so many colleagues at the ACE Annual Meeting in Pasadena, CA, for our Equity and Inclusion Committee Workshop. This year's session featured a powerful and thought-provoking presentation by Dr. Bitu Amani, PhD—Co-Founder and Strategic Advisor of the Black Maternal

Health Center of Excellence (BMHCE), Chair of the Charles R. Drew University Department of Urban Public Health (CDU DUPH), and Associate Professor who also serves as Faculty Trustee on CDU's Board of Trustees.

A social epidemiologist with more than fifteen years of local and global experience, Dr. Amani brings critical insights to the intersections of community health, racism, politics, and disasters. Her research examines how social disinvestment—allocating fewer resources to vulnerable communities—and state-sanctioned violence, such as the criminalization of mental health, drive public health crises, increase morbidity, and widen inequities.

Dr. Amani's topic, "Critical Thinking, Carcerality, and Public Health: A Framework for Epidemiologic Solidarity," challenged us to consider how structural forces shape health outcomes and invited us to envision a more equitable role for epidemiologists in advancing justice. The discussion underscored the importance of critical

reflection, solidarity across disciplines and communities, and a commitment to dismantling the root causes of health inequities.

In addition to her remarks, Dr. Amani recommended several books for those interested in deepening their understanding of the historical, political, and global forces that shape health inequities:

- **How to Hide an Empire:** A History of the Greater United States (*Daniel Immerwahr, 2020*)
- **The Wretched of the Earth** (*Frantz Fanon, 2004*)
- **Red Internationalism** (*Salar Mohandesi, 2023*)
- **Freedom is a Constant Struggle:** Ferguson, Palestine, and the Foundations of a Movement (*Angela Davis, 2020*)
- **The Darker Nations:** A People's History of the Third World (*Vijay Prashad, 2007*)
- **Border and Rule:** Global Migration, Capitalism, and the Rise of Racist Nationalism (*Harsha Walia, 2021*)
- **Turtle Island:** The Story of North America's First People (*Eldon Yellowhorn & Kathy Lowinger, 2017*)

We thank Dr. Amani for sharing her expertise, vision, and challenge to our field to expand the ways we think about health equity and solidarity. We look forward to seeing everyone at next year's meeting in Buffalo, NY.
